I am pleased that, in my first foreword to the VLSSS newsletter as the Director, I am able to comment on a busy yet very successful year of innovative growth that saw great progress towards our vision of excellence.

With sincere deference, I would like to express my words of appreciation to the newly formed committee for appointing me to officially take this position as our new VLSSS Director. I feel very honoured to willingly accept this offer along with the incorporated responsibilities and challenges it brings. My personal journey with VLSSS reveals that I have arrived to this position from a very humble beginning, being a teacher at the very first set up of the school in 2013, and again in 2014 and 2017. In early January 2018, I was assigned the position of Local Teacher Program Manager and Deputy Director before being considered for this position. I am pleased to congratulate all the members of our newly formed committee including our Deputy Director, Mr Graham Hinge, our Academic Manager Miss Audreyan Tamtam, our Local Teacher Program Manager Miss Hancy Tabi, our two Program Officers Miss Sabrina Tabi and Miss Donalyn Maling and the Founder and former Director of the program who is now our new Management Advisor Mr James David Roberts. It is my pleasure to work with you all this year and beyond. All I can say for now is that we have a long journey, a united time will be of utmost importance to successfully achieve our goals and vision as planned. With that, I am looking forward for more positive developments and achievements for the organisation and our little stars in the near future.

I would also like to convey my words of appreciation

to our two main sponsors, British Friends of Vanuatu (BFoV) and the Kiwanis Club, for their continuous financial support, as well as to all friends and families from Vanuatu, Australia, New Zealand, Europe and elsewhere who have contributed in one way or another towards building this program into the resounding success it is today. You all have played a vital role in the development of this program and I really believe without your collective contributions and support, VLSSS would never have come this far.

The year 2018 marked yet more great achievements in the running of the summer school compared with previous years. A milestone achieved this year is the increased number of students and teachers. 100 students attended VLSSS this year with a total of 27 teachers and staff, including the important new addition to the team of a Boarding Master. Among the team of teachers, 20 were from the different islands of Vanuatu and 5 from overseas including a representative from Europe, two from New Zealand and two from Australia. I was pleased to see the teachers really enjoyed their time while also working very hard. Their performance throughout the few weeks spent at the summer school was outstanding! The students showed great interest and passion whilst learning inside the classrooms and actively participating in other extra-curricular activities including helping to reduce the risk of environmental pollution by picking up bottles, cans and plastic in the neighbouring communities. It is encouraging to see the students getting more concerned and taking responsibility for protecting their environment and natural resources. Maintaining the beauty and greenness of our islands is very crucial these days and is absolutely a core theme encouraged at VLSSS.

Other massive steps taken by the summer school this year were the production of a school flag, anthem and motto for the very first time since the establishment of the organisation in 2012. A flag designing competition was organised for all the students, giving them the opportunity to stamp their creativity to the school history. The teachers and staff were also involved in a competition for designing the motto. The management team selection panel finally chose the best flag, created by Esther Matan, a senior student from Central Pentecost. Mrs Kafatu Samana, a teacher from Futuna also created history for herself designing our new school motto 'Shaping leaders for a brighter tomorrow'. The motto fully encompasses the vision of the organisation. The school anthem was composed by a local artist with the help of the management

team. What a heap of milestones achieved in just few weeks!

It was really exciting to see the students successfully acquire essential leadership skills. This was not only because of the inspirational teaching team but also due to the upgraded and very organised curriculum and learning resources. The strong curriculum allowed students to not only grow academically but to also personally develop in other areas such as learning to be more responsible for their own health, hygiene and their natural environment, be able to participate effectively in public speaking, develop strong communication skills and much more. After the first week of moulding, the impact of the teachings was evident, with a complete transformation of all students from being naturally shy to much more talkative and interactive. Despite their different backgrounds, the students were able to creep out from their shells and bloom with lots of confidence.

It is always rewarding to see students with such great potential develop into a mature young person in the few weeks of the program. Thus far, the program has made huge progress on its exciting journey. I am confident that with further effort, innovation and drive, we will be able to celebrate the school's 10th anniversary in 2022 with a great sense of achievement and pride.

VLSSS 2018

What a month it was, it's hard to put into words and do it justice! VLSSS 2018 continued the trend of increasing student and teacher numbers every year since the foundation of the program, as well as raising the bar in terms of program quality. Here's some highlights of a very special few weeks in January:

- 100 students and 27 teachers and staff gathered for this year's summer school – an impressive 67% of students and 60% of teachers were female!
- A Boarding Master was employed by the summer school for the first time, a popular figure around the school working tirelessly to secure the school yard day and night, improving safety and security.
- Students and teachers learnt how to care for their environment, collecting empty bottles, cans, tins and old batteries for recycling. All tins used in the kitchen were put aside for recycling in addition to the awareness raised through the community outreach.
- Sanitation and hygiene were high on the agenda this year, with tippy taps installed all around the school and improvements made to toilet facilities, as well as education on basic practices.
- Gender equality was key, with action and not just words, which was so great to see!
- Positive reinforcement was more important than ever before with star points flying around the school yard, more were awarded than ever before. This eye-opening experience was commented on by many teachers as their most positive aspect of the program.
- The first ever VLSSS library was set-up at this year's summer school and enjoyed by the students. A massive thank you to Mrs Hannah, Miss Maddie and Miss Danielle and other teachers and students for their hard work in setting this up, and of course the Kiwanis Club of Port Vila and the Kiwanis Club of New Zealand for their generous donation of library books.



Proud of Myself

Samarana Rihu was a senior student at this year's summer school, having joined the junior program back in 2014 when the school was hosted at Ranmawot Primary School in South Pentecost. Here's what he had to say about his experiences at VLSSS....

My name is Samrana Rihu and I am one of the students who have been selected to Vanuatu's Little Stars Summer School in 2014 in Ranmawot. I have never expect something like this to happen to me because I thought that white people like Mr James Roberts are just tourist who came to visit our islands and go back to their own country where they came from.

Surprisingly, Pentecost had really inspired him so he decided to organise a really tough learning which he named VLSSS. As a student I am very happy to be selected to VLSSS so that I could learn new things from Mr James Roberts and the other teachers and volunteers.

In VLSSS, it has also inspired me too because I had a lot of friends to do my work with whenever I don't know the answer to any questions. While we were at Ranmawot in 2014, I love to swim every day at the waterfall. I also learn to do drama as now we are doing at Bwatnapni. Sometimes when Mr James make me want to go back home but I realised that that is the only way to learn and so I never give up on what to do.



to thank Mr James Roberts for his hard work at VLSSS and making me proud of myself. I have nothing to give him because he has done a lot to me. But I just wanted to say that in future time, I will help him with the things he needed for our children to use in VLSSS. Thanks Mr James and I am preparing for the future. I love you very much and God will always give you more to give to the students. God bless!

Star points are awarded to students by the teachers throughout the program for showing positive character and values, good effort and participation, great achievements and selflessness. This system is just one component of the strong emphasis on positive reinforcement throughout the school (see Miss Hannah Sau's article on page 7, as well as Nancy Mahinga's article on the same page, and Miss Cindy Buleling's on page 8). This recognition of Samarana's all-round efforts was no more than he deserved.

All of us at VLSSS are extremely proud of you Samarana, and even happier to see how proud of yourself you are, quite rightly so! Good luck with your studies in year 11 at Ranwadi Churches of Christ College this year, we look forward to welcoming you back at the summer school in a few years time to join the team of teachers and continue inspiring those coming through behind you!

Management Structure

Over the past couple of months there has been a huge restructure in the management of the organisation. You will have noticed from the Director's column at the beginning of this edition that there is a change of face at the helm, with Jayford Sarial now taking up the position of Director. Graham Hinge has also been promoted to Deputy Director. Jayford and Graham have both been involved with the program for many years, and basically ran the show at the recent summer school. The personal development that they have experienced over the last few years, as well as their upskilling professionally, both indicate that it is the right time for them to take this step. The organisation is certainly in better hands for it!

Two impressive young women have also been welcomed into the fold, Audrey Tamtam, the new Academic Manager, and Hancy Tabi, the new Local Teacher Program Manager. Whilst they both recently joined their first summer schools, they were identified for their enthusiasm, passion and unique skill sets as ideal candidates to bolster the management team. They were more than excited to be part of the new structure.

Founder and former Director James David Roberts has now transitioned into a support role as Management Advisor. Whilst the management team will be tackling new responsibilities in their roles, they will have the close support and advice of James. He certainly isn't going anywhere! The changes are a natural step in achieving the summer school's vision of shaping leaders, with the energy and ideas of the new team, the organisation can certainly go further than it has ever gone before.

The management team are a core component of a newly formed VLSSS committee, which will meet every two weeks throughout the year to develop the program. There are eight full members of the committee, the Director, Deputy Director, Academic Manager, Local Teacher Program Manager and four Program Officers (with the Management Advisor an observer member and so unable to actually vote on key matters). Sabrina Tabi and Donalyn Maling, both graduates of the summer school program, have taken up two of the Program Officer positions, with two positions currently vacant. Sabrina and Donalyn are two of the summer school's most impressive students, and their insights will be invaluable to the program and its development.

Monday 5th February 2018 was a historic day for VLSSS, the first ever committee meeting was held! It was certainly a productive gathering. Chaired by Director Jayford, it was impressive that only a couple of weeks after the biggest and most successful summer school yet, huge and positive decisions were already being made to plan the next instalment! The coming months promise to be an interesting and exciting time for the organisation.



Shine VLSSS Shine!

It's been an honour and a privilege to be part of Vanuatu's Little Stars Summer School 2018. To begin, I would like to thank the former Director of VLSSS, Mr James Roberts which he is now the Management Advisor, for giving me this infinite privilege to be part of the teaching staff throughout this three weeks of summer school at Bwatnapni.

Honestly, I've really enjoyed the three weeks spent with the students and staff of the summer school. In spite of difficulties in certain situations throughout teaching, the senior staffs of the VLSSS were always there to provide help one way or the other and advices through positive reinforcement, academically, socially, financially and religiously.

Personally, I am a student, studying abroad at the University of the South Pacific in Fiji, undertaking a Bachelor of Science with Graduate Certificate in Education, (BSCGCED). Teaching at the summer school this year was the very first experience I've ever had apart from being in a class for about 10 minutes for short practical teaching at the university. I certainly found something very unique and interesting from this project, something very powerful. The vision states this very clearly and I've proved this now.

Educating our children through facilitating this programme continues to shape and multiply their learning, skills and understanding each year as they attend summer school. As a teacher I have seen changes from students with diverse backgrounds and with different levels of learning from day one to the end. From pre-school experience we all know that attending a school or leaving your parents at home to go to a different place is not very easy, but it is our commitment towards something worthwhile, something we all know will benefit the people of Vanuatu in 10 to 15 years' time that is the summer school.

I have also experienced a teaching philosophy that has been used during the summer school is positive reinforcement. Deep within side me I was so happy when I saw all the teachers began to praise students even when they were wrong. Giving students star points is a new thing for me. During summer school students were given star points each and every day of their summer period from the first day of school up till the last day praising them in every little thing they do. The idea of praising students with star points has really fostered students to study hard and learn

what they were here for. They were also given prizes during their graduation for the students with highest star points in each class.

Outside the classroom students also practice dramas with individual teachers during drama lessons in a suitable environment. And on every Wednesday and Saturday students all get to perform their dramas so crowd can come and watch including the surrounding villages of Bwatnapni. The purpose of these dramas is to mold and shape student to be confident in standing in front of the crowd.

This year, summer school included a plantation walk in one of its weekend activity on one Saturday. The walk was led by me and Mr Glen Molvido and three other assisting staff. Students enjoyed their walk. After the short walk to the plantation we decided to get down to the spring water just nearby Bwatnapni, the spring water is really cold, then we all came back to school safely. With the above walk I could tell that students learn to cooperate as well and this is one of the major methods of learning now days.

Another activity was string band entertainment from a local band of Bwatnapni. Students were amazed by the music especially when they heard the song about summer school. What a beautiful night we had together with teachers and students. I was so impressed seeing students happy throughout the summer school.

Overall, I would like to say that my experience at VLSSS 2018 was one of my extraordinary experiences I ever have in life. I praise our God for showing me that coming to summer school has been his plan all alone. I thank the new Management Advisor, Mr James David Roberts Bulewak, and the newly elected Director, Mr Jayford Sarial and Deputy Director Mr Graham Hinge and all other committee members and every teaching staff for the vivid cooperation, commitments and time spent together as VLSSS 2018 teachers. May the students be the stars to shine throughout Vanuatu and around the world and let God be the light to their way. Shine VLSSS shine!

What a few months it has been for the organisation! I have never been as brimming with excitement as I have been in the recent weeks, and it only builds as each day passes. What warms me the most is seeing how that excitement is shared by many, particularly the membership of the new committee. I have often put together words in this newsletter on behalf of the summer school, but as I hand over responsibilities to the new management team, I would like to take this opportunity to say a few words in a more personal tone.

Passing the baton of management responsibility has been my proudest moment since that first graduation day on 1st February 2013. Director Jayford and Deputy Director Graham have been involved with the program for many years, and have made huge progress in that time. At this year's summer school, they took up the positions of Local Teacher Program Manager and Academic Manager respectively, being promoted further to Deputy Directors for the final week. Actually, in that final week, all of my responsibilities were shared between the two of them, and they were Deputy Directors in title, but in reality were directing the program. It was amazing to see them flourish in their roles. Not only witnessing them utilise many things that they had obviously learnt from myself over the years, but also adding their own personalities and ideas. In that way, I could honestly watch and say that they were doing a better job than I would have been doing myself! So impressive given that I had been Director for over five years but they had been doing it for barely five minutes!

Many might not be aware that Jayford and Graham, as well as our new Local Teacher Program Manager Hancy, were actually students of mine back at Ranwadi Churches of Christ College in 2011. With Program Officers Sabrina and Donalyn both graduates of the summer school program, that means all but our new Academic Manager Audrey have sat in my classroom as students in the past. To not only have them as my colleagues, but for many of them to actually be my superiors, fills me with immense pride! In fact the January just gone was the best month of my life. Spending those few weeks surrounded by 126 individuals who didn't fail to inspire me every single day was such a remarkable experience. Never have a group of people left such an impression on me, as individuals and also as a unique team and family.

Since the organisation was founded in 2012, the program has come a long way. The first summer school in January 2013 far exceeded what I could ever have expected, and each year since, we have taken huge steps forward. This year in particular feels like we have really turned a corner. What is fantastic is that despite the program developing a great deal in that time, the vision of the school has altered very little. The organisation is extremely flexible, welcomes positive changes, and actively creates an environment that encourages feedback and new ideas. Given that in such an innovative setting, the vision has remained consistent, is testament to the strength of that initial vision. We continue to improve the techniques that we use to achieve it, but our guiding vision remains as solid as the foundations on which we began and continue to build upon. I certainly couldn't have imagined many of the ways that we are now going about achieving that vision, but can definitely say that we are shaping leaders for a brighter tomorrow!

I will be in Vanuatu for the rest of my life, and VLSSS will always be at the centre of my being here. Seeing the organisation move beyond my personal grasp however is such an amazing experience. I believe, maybe rather naively in some ways, that VLSSS will be the forum to bring about the development of Vanuatu, its graduates will be the leading figures to bring about social changes that will transform the populations lives for the better. It has always been a long-term vision, and will take many more years to achieve. That pinch of naivety I don't think is a bad thing. We are trying to achieve, and I believe will achieve, what has never been achieved before. Without being a little naïve, I probably would never have founded the organisation in the first place! We also have heaps of energy, creativity, passion, diverse skill sets and strong moral compasses. I believe these characteristics of our new management structure, committee, and growing number of graduates and teachers, will guide VLSSS to achieving its vision, and will bring about positive change and development in this unique country for the benefit of all.
